



TEAMWORK MAKES THE DREAM WORK

On this page, you will be privy to a more behind-the-scenes look. What makes the successes documented throughout the rest of this Year-in-Review possible? If I had to select one word to define the 2022-23 academic year, it would be TEAMWORK.

When I reflect on the collective growth, success, and opportunity experienced by our staff, our partners, and our students, the gratitude I feel for being here, at Shasta College, in this division, at this time, and with this team is overwhelming.

Team transition has been a constant within our program area this year. Let's not be naïve. Team transition can be difficult to navigate even when, as in our case, the reasons for transition are all to be celebrated. Watching your team members grow into realizing their next level of potential is incredibly fulfilling. But it can be difficult on the team. Momentum is often lost, continuity and institutional knowledge take time to recover, and service efficiency often suffers. And yet, even through transition, our students have enjoyed higher levels of success, have expressed more inter-

est in the career pathways we offer, and have increased job placement opportunities upon completion. Why? TEAMWORK.

Our team today looks very different from the team with which we ended the prior year. **Jonas Lindblom** made his debut as our new logging instructor in the 2022 fall semester. By the 2023 spring semester, Jonas had helped grow our logging program to its first-ever max capacity enrollment with a waitlist of program hopefuls. That trend is not slowing as we look ahead to the 2023 FULL fall cohort and watch another waitlist grow.

By December 2022, **Troy Towery** and **Gage Ethridge** had both promoted out of their Instructional Paraprofessional roles. While Gage left our program area to take on the role of Farm Lab Director, Troy redirected his talents to apply an even greater focus on our students with his promotion into a heavy equipment faculty position.

Former heavy equipment students James Johnson and Kai Dickie joined our team in the spring to fill some pretty large work boots left behind by Troy and Gage. With Kai dedicated to supporting our logging program and James focused on our heavy equipment program, these two incredibly hard-working individuals have answered that call-to-action and continue to build on the solid foundation laid before them.

As the 2023 spring semester came to a close, we were faced with one final goodbye as the fantastically talented **Bex Davis**, brave pioneer of all things student success focused, promoted into a new opportunity within the President's office. While we felt all the feels about her moving ON, we joyously celebrated her moving UP.

In her tenure, Bex validated a proof-of-concept model through the incredibly thoughtful student success processes and procedures she developed and refined where before there had been none. Building upon

that work, another team transition finds **Janis Logan** expanding her current role into managing the entire student recruitment/ enrollment/completion pipeline. Janis will be adding to our team with her hiring of two student-focused staff to serve our growing enrollments.

Insufficient capacity to do the work set before us can stress even the best of teams let alone those in the midst of fairly significant transition. To expand our administrative and operational capacity, Administrative Assistant **Patricia Cascio** joined us in April and **Doug Singer** began lending his skills to our truck driving program as an Instructional Paraprofessional in late May.

Very quickly, our team collectively benefited from the value these additional colleagues bring to our programs.

The 2023 spring semester produced overall program enrollment and completion growth and generated observable momentum.

We all feel it. Faculty, staff, administrators, partners, and students. TEAMWORK is what sustained us as we pulled together to fill gaps and extend grace to our new colleagues so they had space to orient themselves to their new roles.

I am proud of each and every member of our team – those we started the year with, those we ended the year with, and those who added value to our collective experience in between.

Our shared goals, whether working together in the program areas outlined within these pages or serving our community of learners in other departments, carry us all forward in the same direction.

We serve as a team, we learn as a team, and we succeed as a team. I am so honored and grateful to be part of this one.




notch training to aspiring truck drivers.

The impact of our program extends beyond the numbers, as we contribute to the growth and skill professionals who will contribute to the community's transportation needs.




California Registered Apprenticeship Forest Training (CRAFT)
